The President's Message

It may be the "off" season for fly fishing unless you are an extreme fly fishing angler who likes to fish in the cold and snow. I used to fish in those conditions, but no more. I will hit Pueblo below the dam or South Boulder below Gross', but it will have to be a day in the 50s without snow.

This isn't to say, however, that WDTU's volunteers aren't busy. We are in the middle of our fund raisers and events/ shows. There are the two fishing shows (The Fly Fishing Show and the International Sportsman's Exposition), the Fly Tying Clinic, CTU's Gala, Fishing Days at Bass Pro, the ongoing Fantasy Raffle and, this year for the first time, a Fly Fishing Rendezvous. We couldn't participate in these events without the help of many WDTU volunteers. I want to thank everyone who has, or will, work one of these events.

We have a special speaker for February—Pat Dorsey from Blue Quill who will speak on fly fishing Colorado's tail waters (see article in this issue for more information). Who knows better than Pat? Along with his presentation, he has also agreed to be our guest fly tier. I'm trying to set up a beer-tasting night, with the Mountain Toad Brewery serving beer. It should be a great night and a fun evening. Mark it on your calendar—February 4th.

At the March meeting, we will hear from WDTU's recipient of our graduate student scholarship. Each year we give a scholarship/grant to a graduate student from Colorado State University who is doing work in cold-water fisheries. This year, the graduate student recipient is Wendy Lanier. She will talk about the Boreal toad and how its habitat is interrelated to that of the greenback trout. The last couple of these graduate student presentations have been interesting and very professional. I'm sure this one will also be entertaining.

Aaron Kindle of National TU, who is currently working with CTU, has been leading the charge on several environmental fronts. He worked on the recent agreement reached on the White River Basin area. He is also working on the effort to preserve the Brown Canyon as a National Monument. And, he is taking the lead on protecting the upper South Park region from being destroyed by oil and gas development. He leads a group that is developing a master leasing plan for the South Park area. He will put together a group for a

roundtable discussion on the Upper South Park for our April program. If you fish or hunt in the South Park, you need to attend.

Finally, there is a need for volunteers to help set up for the Fly Tying Clinic that occurs on February 14th. If you want to help, or want more information, contact Fred Portillo at 720-209-8732. See accompanying article in this issue for more details about the Clinic.


A Note About Email Address Changes

A Cattle Drive to Steamboat

A stream survey occasioned my first visit to the Ladder Livestock Company on Battle Creek. Rancher George Salisbury offered lodging in the bunkhouse, meals with the ranch crew, and a saddle horse if I needed one. I liked this guy right away. Over several years, the survey notes became design plans, and the plans turned into stream projects. We rebuilt irrigation diversions, and we restored stream channel habitat for trout.



The above photo shows an old irrigation diversion site on Battle Creek. Every year a gravel "push-up" dam had been built here to divert flow into the ditch. However, the dam destabilized the stream bed and impeded fish passage in the creek.



The above photo shows the same site after our work was finished. Our solution was to narrow the channel and build a permanent diversion structure. This structure really works well to divert water into the irrigation ditch...just as the gravel push-up dam did. But, more importantly, the new structure allows fish passage up or down stream at any flow, and it stabilizes the channel width.

The friendship with George and his family grew with each of my visits to the ranch. The scene around the cook-house dinner table was especially congenial. At one visit, there happened to be a Mongolian cook along with the regular Peruvian ranch hands. I asked George how he communicated with all these guys. He said he just

talked loudly and waved his arms a lot. He always shared interesting stories of ranching life. Here is one of my favorites from George's teenage years in the 1930s.

In the late fall, usually the week after Thanksgiving, the boys at Ladder Livestock would select the weak animals from the herd and corral them until all the "culls" were collected. On a day when all was in order, the cattle drive would start for Steamboat, sixty miles to the south. The intent was to sell the "culls" in Steamboat and return home with money in the pocket. The drive to Steamboat took several days, and along the way the herd was pastured at other ranches. The ranch families also provided lodging and meals and banter for the Ladder boys. The herd size increased along the way as ranchers added their weakling cows. At last, the combined herd from several outfits reached the sorting pens near the railroad tracks in Steamboat. Very likely, the herd crossed over the Yampa River on the appropriately-named Stock Bridge (The bridge is now renamed after James Brown. Would someone please tell me....no, never mind). The herd was sold and eventually loaded into rail cars for the ride to Denver. The boys relaxed in Steamboat for a time and spent a little money. The ride back home was an enjoyable route through familiar territory and smiling ranch neighbors. At each stop along the way, each rancher was paid for his share of the profit from sale of the herd. Once back at Ladder Livestock, the boys settled into the winter routine of daily feeding and watering as the annual cycle of ranch life continued through the cold months, leading to early calving before spring and the start of a new cycle.

A final note: George died a few years ago. Ladder Livestock Ranch is still a ranch, not a condo village, and is still in the family. George's daughter, Sharon, and her husband, Pat O'Toole, are now the owner-operators. There are still a few stories from George to tell, which will be shared in future ANGLER's EDGE newsletters.

Pat has been commercially tying flies for over 15 years, so we suspect he knows what he is doing. At time of publication of this newsletter, it was not known what Pat will be tying up for us, but you can be assured that it will be a fly that you will want to have in your arsenal.



Our parent organization, Colorado Trout Unlimited (CTU), being a non-profit organization, is always looking for funding sources (as we are). As a consequence, CTU has formed what they call the Century Club. This Club is reserved for people giving a minimum of \$100 per year. For a contribution of \$100, you'll receive updates on CTU's activities through their quarterly "Currents" newsletter. 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Volunteers needed for Windy Peak


The Outdoor Education Laboratory Program (OELS) at Windy Peak (south of Bailey) is under the auspices of the Jefferson County Public School System. The mission of the OELS is to provide 6th grade students the opportunity for hands-on, experiential learning in an outdoor setting. West Denver has been an integral part of this program for close to 20 years—helping to construct a fishing pond and ancillary structures (e.g., fishing platforms and docks) and teaching interested students the rudiments of fly tying.

In addition to teaching students how to tie flies (simple patterns like Wooly Buggers and San Juan Worms), West Denver members help impart a conservation ethic in hopes of encouraging these students to be stewards of the environment later in life. Typically, after teaching students to tie a couple of flies, they're taken down to the nearby fishing pond in hopes that they can catch something with their own creations. The fly tying classes usually begin in April and may continue through October. There is no rhyme or reason to the number of classes that may be taught, but usually only one or two classes a month is requested. Greenback Trout Restoration Projects

The status or lineage of the "greenback" has been turned upside down in light of results from the new genetic and meristic research that has been conducted. However, there are some upcoming prospective projects for greenback restoration that will be of interest to West Denver members: Dry Gulch and Herman Gulch in the Clear Creek headwaters are two potential small population sites (about 2-2.5 miles each). It's possible that at least one of these streams will be subject to greenback restoration this year. Regardless, restoration at each project site will require coordination among the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the U.S. Forest Service, the Colorado Department of Transportation and, possibly, the Loveland Ski Area. Fly Tying Clinic—February 14th

On February 14th, West Denver is holding its 39th annual Fly Tying Clinic at the Jefferson County Fairgrounds. Our Clinic is the gold standard for this type of event---other TU chapters have tried to emulate us, but they haven't been successful.

At this Clinic, we feature about 60 of the best tiers from the Rocky Mountain region. We have the local showcase names like Rim Chung, Charlie Craven, Pat Dorsey, and Greg Garcia, but also present are outstanding tiers from other parts of the State and region. In addition to the tiers, we'll have a silent auction, a bucket raffle, door prizes, and our Fantasy Raffle (a package worth approximately \$4,400 that you can win with a \$5 ticket). Wanted (still): Newsletter Editor


